Jerry W. Davis was a serious businessman as well as a prankster. He could put your name into the latest e-mail or mention it at a banquet while speaking; you would become the latest joke. Mr. Davis was an advocate for equality. One day he heard something about sickle cell anemia and how it affected the African American population and decided he wanted to do something about it. There was a time when he was buying a piece of land to develop in Hot Springs when a certain man told him that he didn't want any blacks living in that area. Mr. Davis replied to the man, "I have a good friend named Keith Jackson who played professional football and he's black, and I'm going to sell him the first lot." I was glad that Mr. Jerry W. Davis called me friend and that he left a legacy.

Reggie White was my best friend in the N.F.L. Reggie had two nicknames, the Minister of Defense and Big Dog. The Big Dog was the greatest defensive lineman to ever play the game. He had what every player wants and every coach dreams of in a defensive lineman--speed, quickness and strength. He could sling a 350 pound offensive lineman like he was a lightweight, then jump over an unsuspecting running back's head, then run down the average quarterback. The Big Dog was unstoppable and will go into the N.F.L. Hall Fame the first time he's eligible in 2006.

The Minister of Defense stood up for what he believed. He would preach in the locker room, as well as on the football field. Professional sports became his pulpit and the nation became his congregation. The Minister of Defense would say "If you have the right to push your belief over on me, then I have the right to preach Jesus to you." Today he would call him Yushua, Jesus in translation. Reggie never gave up his belief in Jesus; he just wanted to call him by his Hebrew name. He also stopped using the term Christian because it had become religious. Christianity is not a religion; it's a revelation between God & man. He just wanted to be called a Believer.

Then there's Reggie White, the friend I loved as my brother. Reggie was a great mentor to many young professional athletes. It wasn't what he said, it was the way he lived his life. Reggie White's life was the biggest sermon I'd ever seen. I often disagreed with some of the things he said. But, he lived his life in a way that was pleasing to God. There were so many young men who grew up with no father in their lives or they had a father, but there was no relationship. Reggie White was a shining example of how you live your life. 1) Love God; 2) Love your wife; 3) Love your children; 4) Love your relatives; 5) Love your neighbor.

This was a December to remember. It was also a December to celebrate; a celebration of the home going of two good friends and two good men. Reggie White and Jerry Davis had two things in common: they left a legacy and they shared a birthday, December 19th.

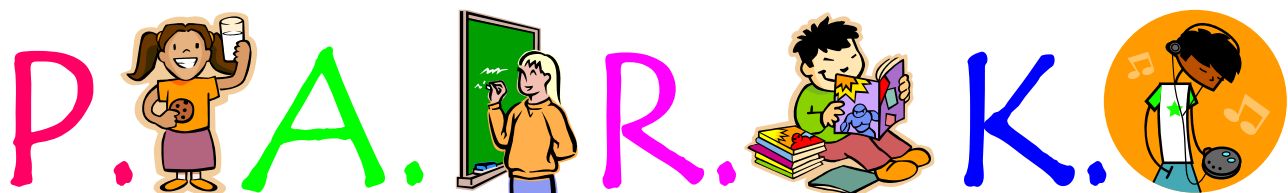
