P.A.R.K. Plans for a Proficient Year

Students Will Get Down to Work After Christmas

P.A.R.K.'s Academic Program is dedicated to moving all students to higher levels of academic performance as Arkansas Law, Act 2243, requires schools to place students who are not proficient on the Benchmark and/or End-of-Course exams on an Academic Improvement Plan. Students at the elementary and middle school level who fail to participate in this process will be retained and will not be promoted to the next grade level. At the high school level, students who are identified as not meeting satisfactory pass levels for an End-of-Course exam, and fail to participate in the plan will not receive credit on their transcript for the course.

Arkansas students score in one of four performance levels on the Benchmark exam: below basic, basic, proficient and advanced. A student scoring proficient is considered to have mastery of the skills and materials set forth in the frameworks for each subject and each grade. The statewide percentages of 8th grade students performing proficient or advanced on the

2005 Benchmark exams are as follows:
